My reflections:
There was strong perceptions from victim family and non-lawyers that many sentences for child homicide were too low and failed to properly acknowledge the value of the victim.
Lawyers, victim families and community members seem to be talking past each other – lawyers and judges devalue family grief, family and community often are unaware of the multitudinous factors that affect sentences.

My ideas to improve current criminal justice system responses:

Add a factor to s9(2) and/or 9(3) regarding causing death.

Consider increased minimum non-parole periods for murder for vulnerability of children (and other vulnerable people) similar to that for killing police.

Have differential discounts for early and late pleas.

Publish sentencing remarks, without fees.

Publish explanations of sentencing in layperson's language and perhaps include a link with online publication of sentencing remarks.

Other comments/views:

Families are insulted by substantial sentence discounts for cost and time savings for the Court. It seems to send a message that saving money and court convenience is more important than the homicide victim. Discounted sentences for guilty pleas should focus more on sparing families from pain, acknowledgement of guilt and remorse, rather than Court and State resources.

There should be better publication and explanation of sentencing factors, reasoning and comments.
