## About the Council

The Queensland Sentencing Advisory Council is an independent statutory body established under the *Penalties and Sentences Act 1992.* 

The Council:



Provides advice to the Attorney-General about sentencing matters, if asked

Gives information to the community to enhance knowledge of sentencing

Publishes information about sentencing

Researches sentencing matters and publishes the outcomes

Obtains the community's views on sentencing

Provides its views to the Court of Appeal

on the giving or reviewing of a guideline judgment, if asked.

#### **Council members**

The Council comprises up to 12 members who are appointed by the Governor in Council on the recommendation of the Attorney-General.

Members are accountable to the community and to the Attorney-General and Minister for Justice, Minister for Women and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence, the Honourable Shannon Fentiman MP.

Members' fields of expertise include legal professionals and community advocates with extensive experience across criminal law, domestic and family violence, victims of crime, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander justice issues and youth justice.

### The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Panel

Established in 2018, the Council's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Panel plays an essential role in assisting us to understand the over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in Queensland's criminal justice system.

Since its introduction, the Advisory Panel has given a stronger voice to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, helping to build the Council's knowledge

of the implications of sentencing, sharing how Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities are affected by legal responses, and providing insight and specialised advice into what changes might improve outcomes for First Nations Peoples. The Advisory Panel has up to eight members.

### **The Secretariat**
