
Sentencing Spotlight on...manslaughter

Manslaughter is generally referred to as the unlawful killing of a person without intent. This Sentencing Spotlight looks at sentencing outcomes for the offence of manslaughter finalised in the Queensland Courts between I July 2005 and 30 June 2016.

Summary of offences 2005–06 to 2015–16



224 offenders 8 offenders under 17 years 216 17 years and over



16.5% female



Average age at sentencing 34.5 years Male average age 33.9 years Female average age 36.7 years



70.5% of cases the offender known to victim



92% immediate prison sentence

6.2% partially suspended sentence

1.8% wholly suspended sentence



75.5% plead guilty



95.7% males imprisoned 4.3% males partially or wholly suspended sentence

73.0% females imprisoned 27% females partially or wholly suspended sentence



21.4% offenders Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people (3.8% population)
